SUBJECT: Troy Multi-Modal Transit Facility

Over the last decade, the City's vision of a Transit Center has evolved from the acquisition of land for transit purposes by consent judgment with Grand Sakwa, to the imminent start of construction in 2012.

On September 12, 2011 City Council approved an MDOT Capital Contract for \$8,485,212 for the specific purpose of designing and building the Transit Facility at no cost to the City of Troy. These funds require that the project be designed, bid, built and opened by October 1, 2013. Accordingly, a contract for Architect and Engineering services will be presented to City Council and must be awarded no later than December 19, 2011 in order to meet the stringent funding and construction time lines.

If a majority of City Council wishes to terminate the transit center project, this would require a resolution to rescind, which should be voted on at the earliest opportunity. If this occurred, then the federal funds would be returned to the Federal government for disbursement to another project elsewhere in the country, possibly to another state. These funds have been programmed for use under the Passenger Rail Investment and Improvement Act of 2008 (PRIIA) and the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009 (ARRA) for the purposes of high-speed and intercity passenger rail capital improvements. These funds could not be used for any other non-transit related purpose or other City of Troy projects.

None of the \$8,485,212 in federal funds has been spent at this time. The \$350,000 MDOT grant awarded to the project previously was for planning purposes and does not require repayment should the project not move forward. Significant MDOT, Federal Rail Administration and City staff time and resources to date have been expended; these are not future financial liabilities.

Attached is a synopsis of the project as well as a memo detailing the legal proceedings involving the Transit Center parcel. These items are meant to supplement a presentation by staff at the study session on November 21, 2011.

- The core mission of the DRMT plan is to repair and upgrade existing facilities and provide improved transit opportunities, while laying out a plan for future mass transit development
 - Troy Multi-Modal Transit Center is intended to contribute to the regional effort to improve the attractiveness, reliability, safety and economic efficiency of transportation service in the metropolitan Detroit region
 - The Transit Center proposes to co-ordinate all existing transit services in the area through this site, and to add new connections that will provide substantial improvements to the reliability and efficiency of the existing transit system
- The project team worked with SMART to ensure that the design of the site will be appropriate for a regional transit hub, and to ensure that SMART's needs are met onsite. A drop-off area with four (4) bus slips for SMART buses is proposed for the site
 - The cities of Birmingham and Troy collaborated with SMART on the development of the Transit Center, and SMART agreed to coordinate all Birmingham and Troy bus routes through the Transit Center, thereby creating a regional hub, to provide enhanced local and regional connections and to improve access to jobs
 - Federal funds in the amount of \$1.3 million were included in the Fiscal Year 2010 Transportation, Housing and Urban Development Appropriations Act, signed by the President on December 16, 2009
 - January 2010, DELEG awarded \$250,000 grant for LED site lighting, building and tunnel lighting (Grant was rescinded by the State based on schedule of the project not meeting grant timelines after Birmingham withdrew from the project)

 - Environmental Assessment submitted to FRA, May 15, 2010

SUBJECT: Transit Center Parcel Litigation Involving Grand Sawka

The City acquired the Transit Center parcel through the Consent Judgment for the 77 acre Midtown Development at Maple and Coolidge, which was entered on May 4, 1999. This Consent Judgment was subsequently amended and restated on June 2, 2000. Pursuant to the terms of this Consent Judgment, Grand Sakwa was permitted to construct its proposed mixed commercial and residential development, even though our zoning ordinance at the time did not allow for planned unit developments, and also did not allow for the proposed intensity of the development. The Consent Judgment required Grand Sakwa to conditionally transfer the Transit Center property to the City of Troy. The Transit Center property is the triangle piece of property that is located adjacent to the City of Birmingham, and is to the west of the commercial development. The location of the railroad tracks made this location ideal for a transportation center.

Under the terms of the negotiated Consent Judgment, Grand Sakwa was to convey the land to the City for use as a Transportation Center. If the property was not used for a Transportation Center, then it would revert to Grand Sakwa. The Consent Judgment required the City to "fund" the Transportation Center within ten years from the date of the Judgment (June 2, 2010). The City has been the legal owner of this property since June 22, 2001, when the warranty deed was recorded with the Register of Deeds.

Grand Sakwa filed a post judgment motion with the Oakland County Circuit Court in June 2010, arguing that the City did not comply with the terms of the Consent Judgment, since it did not "fund" the Transportation Center by June 2, 2010. The Oakland County Circuit Court ultimately ruled against Grand Sakwa, and dismissed the matter in May 2011. This ruling was based, in part, on the project award of 8.4 million dollars under the American Reinvestment Recovery Act of 2009- High Speed Intercity Passenger Rail Program (HSIPR) and the 1.3 million dollar federal appropriation for the project through the December 2009 Transportation, Housing, and Urban Development Appropriations Act, Bus and Bus Facility Program. Grand Sakwa then filed a Motion for Reconsideration, which was denied by the Oakland County Circuit Court.

More recently, Grand Sakwa filed an appeal of right in the Michigan Court of Appeals, seeking a return of the Transit Center parcel. The Michigan Court of Appeals dismissed this appeal, since there is no appeal of right for post-judgment motions. Grand Sakwa has now filed a Motion for Reconsideration of this decision, which is now pending. If the Michigan Court of Appeals upholds its earlier dismissal, then Grand Sakwa has the option of filing an Application for Leave to Appeal with the Michigan Court of Appeals.

I will keep you updated on the status of this matter.

7. PUBLIC HEARING – FUTURE LAND USE PLAN & TRANSPORTATION PLAN

Mr. Miller stated, in accordance with the Municipal Planning Act (Public Act 285, 1931 as amended) the Planning Commission is required to conduct one public hearing prior to the adoption of the Future Land Use Plan and Transportation Plan. The notification process included a public hearing notice in the Troy-Somerset Gazette and registered mail notice to the City's public utility and railroad companies. The adoption of the Plans shall be by resolution of the Planning Commission carried by the affirmative votes of not less than six (6) members of the Planning Commission. The resolution shall refer expressly to the maps and text intended by the Planning Commission to form the whole or part of the Plan. An attested copy of the Plan shall then be certified to City Council and to the Register of Deeds. Mr. Miller then summarized the Future Land Use Plan and its components.

Mr. Chamberlain stated that the Natural Features Map should be cross-referencing flood plain information and strike revisions on the Transportation Plan, and to leave the Natural Features Map dates blank.

Mr. Storrs commented on the fact that the Transportation Plan was never made available to SEMCOG and that we might recommend after we adopt the Master Plan, that we send it to them.

Mr. Waller commented on the Transportation Plan related to the 10 ft. safety and walkway path, and asked if anyone has corresponded or communicated with those who own property in the proposed location.

Mr. Miller stated there has been no staff communication.

Mary Bogush of 5916 Patterson, Troy asked why the fire pots or preservation areas referenced were to be removed.

Mr. Chamberlain stated they were not necessarily located correctly. Natural Features Map will achieve the same goal as the fire pots or preservation areas.

Mr. Storrs stated if you look at it another way, the fire pots were the totality of the natural features designation, while the Natural Features Map is very specific.

5. PUBLIC HEARING – CITY OF TROY MASTER PLAN – 2008 City of Troy Master Plan

Mr. Miller introduced the agenda item.

WHEREAS, The City of Troy received a \$8,485,212 federal grant to fund the transit facility project through the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act (ARRA) High-Speed Intercity Passenger Rail (HSIPR) Program, Federal Rail Administration (FRA), secured through a TIGER grant; and

WHEREAS, The City of Troy received a \$1,300,000 Federal Congressional Bus & Bus Facilities earmark to fund the project through the Federal Transit Administration (FTA), secured by Congressman Gary Peters; and

WHEREAS, The facility will be served by AMTRAK and the Suburban Mobility Authority for Regional Transportation (SMART), which will utilize the Troy Multi-Modal Transit Facility as a central hub for their bus network; and

WHEREAS, The Troy Multi-Modal Transit Facility complements transit oriented initiatives throughout southeast Michigan, including the Woodward Light Rail and Detroit Region Aerotropolis projects; and

WHEREAS, Studies show that investment in public transit yields economic benefit to the surrounding area; and

WHEREAS, Public transportation provides transportation options, allows for mobility for underserved populations, provides congestion mitigation, creates jobs, assists in retaining young talent and helps regions to be competitive in the global economy.
